## Trophy streak continues for Glenwood Jazz Band at Iowa Jazz Championships

It must be April.

The daffodils are in bloom, the grass is turning green and the Glenwood Jazz Band has earned another trophy at state competition.

Glenwood's varsity Gold Band finished in fifth place in the Class 3A competition at last week's Iowa Jazz Championships in Ames.

"Another good year of jazz," GCHS Jazz Director Dan Schoening said. "The goal is to get into the top eight in general. The top five is that next tier, so placing fifth was really nice for us.

"Third is the highest we've ever placed. We've gotten fourth a few times, fifth a few times and we've been in the top eight every year since 2010, so it's been quite a nice run."

Pella placed first in the 3A competition at state with Harlan capturing the runner-up trophy. Denison, a member of the Hawkeye 10 Conference with Glenwood and Harlan, also earned a top eight finish. Schoening said there are between 75 and 100 Class 3A jazz bands in Iowa. Several schools, including Glenwood, have more than one band. Glenwood was among 15 bands that qualified for the state competition. A dozen bands qualified by finishing first or second at district competitions and three were selected as

### Mills County dispatcher honored for helping save young child's life

Dawn Christensen became a 911 dispatcher because she wanted to make a positive difference in the lives of others - just like the dispatcher who helped save her son Ryan's life 23 years ago.

"The reason I became a 911 dispatcher is in 2000, my son, who was under 2 years old, had a seizure and stopped breathing. Me, being a very young mom at the time, I didn't know how to do CPR so I called 911," Christensen recalled. "The Pott County dispatcher walked me through CPR for my son and kept him breathing until the paramedics got there. I realized that my son would not be here without that 911 dispatcher. My son would not be here without that paramedic bagging him all the way to the hospital. My son wouldn't be here unless they had the skilled doctors and everyone that took care of him. That started me thinking about emergency services.

"That led me on a journey wanting to help one person the way they helped me."

Christensen became a Mills County Communications Center dispatcher in 2002 and has taken thousands of emergency calls during her career, but

maybe none that hit as close to home as the call she took last December, just three days before Christmas.

It was a call from the Silver City area that was handed downed from the Pottawattamie County Communications Center. It involved a young child that wasn't breathing and turning blue. Initially, Christensen only heard screaming on the other end of the phone, coming from the terrified parents of the child.



Bissen, who has served as Glenwood Community High School's activities director since 2012, will receive a \$10,000 raise as part of that agreement. Bissen's base salary contract for compensation and benefits for fiscal year 2023 is \$110,858. That figure for fiscal year 2024 will increase to \$120,950.

"We are excited that Mr. Bissen agreed to the terms of his contract, and we're excited about the opportunities ahead to focus on the betterment of our student athletes and students involved in cocurricular activities," Portrey said.

Bissen, 37, and his wife are both Harlan natives. Turning down a return home wasn't easy. But at the end of the day, Bissen said, staying in Glenwood was in his and his family's best interest.

"The process was tough because we

had an opportunity to go home where we have family and friends," Bissen said. "On the flip side, we had an opportunity to continue to make this our home which we have done for the last 12 years."

Bissen is considered one of the top activities directors in the region. In 2020, he was named one of eight finalists – and the only one hailing from Iowa – for the National High School Athletic Coaches Association Athletic Director of the Year. Bissen won the Iowa High School Athletic Director Association Activities Director of the Year for Southwest Iowa in 2017, the same year he was honored as the Southwest Iowa Wrestling Athletic Director of the year by the Wrestling Coaches Association. In 2016, the Iowa Girls Coaches Association awarded him its Basketball Administrator of the Year

Award.

Harlan's rumored interest in Bissen had circulated since the March 10 resignation of Cyclone AD Davis Pattee. Glenwood's March board of education meeting brought out an overflow crowd of parents, students and community members to show their appreciation of Bissen and encourage the district to retain him. At Monday's meeting, those supporters got their wish. More than three dozen in the gallery were on hand for the announcement, with some clapping following Portrey's announcement.

"When it came down to making a final decision whether to move and go back home to Harlan, we kept coming back to the fact that we love where we live and there have been a lot of positives for our family to live in Glenwood," Bissen said.





wildcards. Glenwood qualified by finishing second at the Dick Bauman Jazz Band Festival, a district qualifier for southwest Iowa jazz bands.

Glenwood performed four songs at the state championships - Switch In Time, Black, Brown and Beautiful, I Mean You and Grease Wheezer.

"It was really fun, a great experience," saxophone player Sydney Rohrberg said.

Schoening said the Glenwood band was a veteran group with no glaring weaknesses.

"We had really good student leadership this year. The work ethic was great," he said. "The kids always showed up for rehearsals. They were on time. They worked really, really hard. Sometimes they came in and did sectionals on their own, even when I couldn't be there because I was over at the middle school running the band. They would get together on their own."

Jessica Herron, who plays the bass and electric guitar, echoed Schoening's thoughts on the band's success this year.

"I'm really proud," she said. "Everybody showed up on time and was there every day," she said.

Herron and other veteran band members said the competition at the state championships was stronger than one year ago, which made the fifth-place performance even more meaningful. Schoening agreed with his students' assessment.


"Absolutely. Jazz in general is getting stronger and stronger in Iowa," he said. "It's kind of a pioneer in the country Iowa is known across the country for having the Iowa Jazz Championships. It's one of the very few states across the country that actually has a state championship like this for jazz."

In addition to the band's trophy, two Glenwood band performers earned Outstanding Soloist recognition – Trice Buchanan and Mayer Buchanan.

"Trice has been a great leader this year in the rhythem section," Schoening said. "He works really hard. He played drums on two songs and he played piano on another song. He stepped up really big. He and Jessica Herron were really good leaders in that rhythm section.

"Mayer is a tuba player, but he plays bass trombone in this. We added his solo in late just for the state championships and he just nailed it. He sounded great."

"I didn't expect to win any awards," Trice Buchanan said.

kids received outstanding soloist awards at some point during our many jazz festivals," Schoening said. "Solo awards at the championships are very difficult to obtain and the majority of the bands only received one or two.

Glenwood has now qualified for 19 straight Iowa Jazz Championships. The bar is set high, Schoening acknowledged.

"There's really only us and three other bands that have had this good of a run over the past 20 years," he said. "I feel that pressure. I feel that stress, no doubt. The kids are probably handling it way better than I do, to be honest. They're the ones that say, 'don't worry, we've got this."

Schoening noted that Glenwood had 20 musicians in this year's Gold Jazz Band that went to state. The school has a second Black Band made up primarily of underclassmen.

"As always, we're very proud of the kids," Schoening said. "Thanks to Mr. (David) Clark, he comes over and helps us. He also does a great job of working the younger kids in the second band so when they come up they're better prepared than we've ever had them before.

"We collaborate and work well together. We call it Schark Jazz – a silly play on our names."

### 'Thin Gold Line' a show of support for dispatchers

Many Mills County businesses are being draped with a "Thin Gold Line" this week to "honor public safety telecommunicators for their commitment, service, and sacrifice."

National Public Safety Telecommunicators Week began Sunday, April 9 and runs through Saturday, April 15.

County Mills Communications Center Director Travis Hitchcock said Telecommunicators Week and the public display of the Thin Gold Line is a way for citizens to thank E911 dispatchers for the public service they provide to their community.

"Really, it's an incredible thing that they do but I think unfortunately sometimes it does get overlooked - the stresses that they deal with every single day," Hitchcock said. "It's that silent voice in the dark – the one who picks up the phone."

Hitchcock said the dispatchers play a critical role in all emergency response situations.

"There is a lot going on underneath and more people involved with every response - every fire truck or ambulance you see with its lights on or every cop car that's at your house, there's a lot underneath that is taking place with these folks here in the 911 center," he said.

Placing a gold line on your home or business may seem like a small gesture, but it's one that's appreciated by Mills County's team of dispatchers.

"They call us the golden glue that holds everything together," dispatcher Dawn Christensen said.

Mills County currently has six full-time dispatchers on its roster and two in training. Hitchcock said 10 are needed to bring the communications center to full strength. He noted that there are many times when only one dispatcher is on duty and is isn't uncommon for that person to be handling

multiple calls and coordinating communications between responding agencies at the same time.

Hitchcock said communications center employees are very thankful for the efforts of the Mills County Chamber of Commerce, Glenwood Fire and Rescue, Mills County Sheriff's Office and other volunteers that have assisted with placing the Thin Gold Line around Glenwood's Town Square, on Main Street in Malvern and at other businesses throughout the county. The dispatchers are also appreciative of the food some businesses have been sending their way throughout the week.

to come down and locate where they were because they were absolutely just screaming and I can completely understand because I've gone through a situation like that myself," Christensen said. "He wasn't breathing and he was blue. One thought was that he was having a seizure, but he wasn't trembling, so we just had them lay him down and I asked them to clean out his mouth to see if there was anything in there. Once they kind of did that, he started to breath again.

"He was sick so I don't know if he had choked on some phlegm or something like that or maybe on something he had eaten. I never found that out. Once they cleaned out his mouth and airway, he started to breath again."

It took a few minutes for the child to start breathing again after Christensen got on the phone with the couple and got them calmed down. It seemed much longer, however.

"For me, it felt like forever," Christens said. "I'm sure for the parents, it felt like forever, too."

Christensen stayed on the phone with the couple until rescue personnel arrived. "We needed to make sure this child continued to breath and his color got better," she said.

The child did recover, thanks to the guidance Christensen provided to the parents. For her professional actions 'Listen, I will bring you hot chocolate and

"It took a good minute for the transfer on the call, Christensen was recently presented a Life Saving Award from the Mills County Sheriff's Office.

> Christensen said she's thankful the situation had a positive outcome and pointed out that the call served as a stark reminder of why she became a dispatcher.

> "It feels full circle because I knew exactly what the panic was," she said. "I couldn't even remember my own address when I called 911. Thankfully, they were able to locate me.

> "It feels full circle for me because I finally feel like I've made a difference for one person. That's all I wanted."

During her career, Christensen has certainly made a difference for hundreds of people. In fact, in 2017, she was nominated for the Iowa Dispatcher Of The Year Award for her actions in helping save the lives of a father and son who fell through the ice while fishing at Willow Slough Wildlife and Recreation Area a few days before Christmas. Rescue personnel had difficulty locating the father and son because of their remote location.

"It took us a long time to find them and I stayed on the phone about 45 minutes with them while we tried to locate them," Christensen recalled. "I kept telling them to walk toward the shore and they kept saying, 'We can't go any further, we're too cold, we can't do it.' I kept saying, warm you up after this,' we've just got to keep going and keep moving.'

The man and his son were eventually located and ended up having to be transported to an Omaha hospital by medical helicopter because they were suffering from hypothermia. It was another positive outcome, thanks in great part to Christensen's work.

Mills County Communications Director Travis Hitchcock said the recognition Christensen, the senior dispatcher in Mills County, has received is well deserved.

"From what I've seen and working on the emergency management side prior to this, I would expect nothing less from Dawn," he said. "I truly believe she's incredible and an example of the service those people (in the communications center) provide every day.'

Hitchcock noted that Christensen will be presented a Milestone Of Achievement Award from the national Association Of Public Safety Communications Officials (APCO) on May 1.

Although she's appreciative of the awards, Christensen said her true satisfaction comes from helping others.

"I truly am passionate about dispatching," she said. "It gets in your blood and it gets in your soul. You make a difference for people and that's all I really wanted when I started my career - to make a difference for one family the way a dispatcher made a difference for me.'

## Govt. reorganization, property tax assessments

This past week Governor Reynolds signed SF 514, the state government alignment and reorganization bill. This bill was the first major reorganization of Iowa state government in

40 years. Although this bill was long and had many moving parts, the governor's concept was pretty simple. If the federal government can operate on with 13 cabinet level directors, certainly the State of Iowa can operate on 16 cabinet-level directors. The bill seeks to increase efficiencies and the cost savings over the next four years estimated by the governor's office to be over \$200 million.

SF 514 created many moving parts in state government. With all those changes in process, the Senate started the appropriations process this week, moving several budget bills out of subcommittee and committee. These bills generally addressed the budget areas but left many details to be filled in after the Senate and House negotiate a budget agreement. Senate Republicans and Governor Reynolds have set a budget target of \$8.486 billion. The House, as usual, has set a target about \$95 million higher than the governor and the Senate.

Along with being consistent with the target set by Governor Reynolds, \$8.486 billion represents a sustainable increase in spending for education and public safety, while also ensuring tax relief for hardworking Iowans. Iowa's income tax rates have decreased from 8.98% to 6% this year in addition to the elimination of the tax on retirement income. By 2026 the income tax rate will be a flat 3.9%. This tax relief has been made possible because of budgets just like the one proposed this year. Disciplined spending ensures promises to K-12 education are kept, promises to public safety are kept, and promises to taxpayers are kept.

#### **Property Tax Assessments Raise Concerns**

We continue to receive questions and concerns from taxpayers all over the state as counties send out updated property tax assessments to Iowans.

We have heard these concerns, and it is our primary focus as we head into these last scheduled weeks of the legislative session. Several proposals in the legislature to address these concerns and alleviate the burdens on Iowa property taxpayers are being considered in both chambers. Senate Republicans are focused on getting to the core of the issue by simplifying and consolidating the number of levies used by local governments, limiting levies that seem open-ended for additional spending, reinstating hard levy caps, providing a series of controls to protect taxpayers, and eliminating loopholes abused by local governments to exceed limits set by law. We are asking local governments to follow the Senate's example. We are simply asking local governments to control spending, invest in important priorities, and give taxpayer money back to those who earned it. Senate Republicans have used these principles to guide us the last several years and it has put us to the strong fiscal place we are today.

Governor Reynolds also signed Senate File 445 on Tuesday. It allows ten-member boards of review to meet in groups of at least three to hear assessment protest cases. Like our own subcommittees, which get input on bills before they go before the full legislative committee, these sub-units would provide a recommendation to the full board for a final decision. With the number of Iowans preparing to protest their property tax assessments this year, this change will allow larger boards to hear more cases and get through more of them quickly.



### Legislators shouldn't be 'yes men' for Gov. Reynolds

A few days ago, I and all the other property owners in Mills County received a piece of mail that should have been draped in black - our new property value assessment notice. This is one step closer to taxing us out of our homes, especially those of us on fixed incomes.

It is my understanding that the counties are required, by an edict from Des Moines, to raise property value annually. But I don't think they are required to use the highest amount that they can come up with. Just because a few people have been stupid enough to pay more for a property than what it is really worth does not mean we all should be punished.

After speaking to some other property owners, it appears that property value in the city were raised by about 25%, and in the county about 40%. This can

be controlled if our state legislature would pass a law limiting property value increases to a more 3% to 5% annually.

The people we send to Des Moines are sent there to work for us on subjects we think are important, such as land and water control, taxes, safety, criminal punishment, etc., not to pass laws like the one to take taxes and give them to private schools. ### ■ February 1998 - Another banner season for Ram wrestling Rams 2nd at state; Madison wins championship at 145

Excerpt From The Opinion-Tribune March 4, 1998

DES MOINES - So what if Glenwood is one of the smallest Class 3A wrestling schools in the state - ranked 60th in enrollment out of the 64 teams in the large-school

On the wrestling mat, Glenwood is one of the premiere schools in Iowa, regardless of class.

That point was proven again last weekend at Veterans Auditorium as the Rams muscled their way to a second-place finish in the Class 3A portion of the Iowa State Wrestling Tournament.

Paced by the senior performances of 145-pound state champion Clint Madison and 160-pound runner-up Terry Parham, the Rams tallied 85 points in the three-day extravaganza, falling just four points short of first-place Cedar Falls.

"Our kids came in here believing we could win. It's been one of our goals from the beginning of the season," Glenwood Coach Bob Dyer said. "They (Glenwood's eight state tournament qualifiers) all did a good job, considering we didn't get the best draws. They wrestled hard and they wrestled well."


Along with Madison and Parham, Glenwood's state qualifiers were sophomore Jason Black (119), senior Kyle Naughton (130), junior Benn Christiansen (135), junior Justin Crouch (140), senior Marc Kincade (189) and junior Dennis Anderson (275).

Madison's 11-9 overtime win over Sioux City Heelan's Jerry Riecks in Saturday night's championship round was the crowning individual achievement of the tournament for Glenwood.

Parham, who captured the 152-pound championship last year, also made his last appearance at Vets Auditorium a memorable one. He reached the finals with three impres-

sive victories Thursday and Friday. He had pins in his first two matches and then edged Sean Stender of Eldridge, 4-3, in the semis.

### Riding the Mormon Trail on the 150th anniversary of migration

Yeah, I know, I've been around a long time. So long I can say I rode in a covered wagon on the Mormon Trail.

Well, sort of.

In April 1997, I had the opportunity to spend some time riding in one of the covered wagons traveling across the Great Plains during the 150-year anniversary re-enactment of the famous Mormon Migration from Nauvoo, Ill., to Salt Lake City.

The first leg of the re-enactment, from Nauvoo to Council Bluffs, actually took place in 1996. The journey picked up again in the spring of '97 with more than 100 men, women and children retracing the southern route of the Mormon Migration, known as the Ox Bow Trail.

I spent time riding alongside Glenwood residents Marland and Bev Gammon as the wagon train made its way from Council Bluffs to Pacific Junction for an overnight emcampment. As I recall, the trek from Council Bluffs to Pacific Junction took several hours and was the first day of a three-month, 1,100-mile journey to Salt Lake City.

Unlike the original Mormon travelers making their way to Utah for religious freedom, those taking part in the 1997 journey had the luxury of traveling on a paved path for a good part of the ride. In Mills County, the wagon train traveled south on County Road L-31 (195th Street)

### Mormon spirit alive on trail

PACIFIC JUNCTION - The pioneer spirit of the great Mormon Migration could be felt in

southwest Iowa Saturday morning. With sunny skies overhead and temperatures climbing into the 70s, more than 100 courageous travelers began their 1,100-mile journey from Council Bluffs to Salt Lake City, Utah. The trek, being staged in honor of the 150th anniversary of the Mormon Trail ride, is the second leg of a journey that began last year in

Nauvoo, Ill. The men, women and children who began their journey west Saturday are retracing the southern route of the Morman Migration, known as the Ox Bow Trail. The travelers received a grand sendoff at the Grand Encampment in Council Bluffs, the community first named Kanesville by the original Mormon travelers. The sendoff included a pancake breakfast, entertainment and speeches from several local

dignitaries, including wagon master Greg Leger, who is leading the group across the Great Plains.

"I'm honored to take part in this great tribute to the Mormon Migration," Leger said. "The migration is part of the history in this area. We look forward to reliving some of that history."

Leger said the travelers on the journey will experience first-hand some of the hardships the original migrants encountered a century and a half ago.

The trail ride is scheduled to last three months.

"I'm reliving a part of history," trail rider Floyd Hohl of Donnellson, Iowa, said. "I rode the first leg last year from Nauvoo to Council Bluffs. I know what to expect. It wasn't easy."

Saturday's journey took the travelers from Council Bluffs to an encampment in Pacific Junction. Entertainment and a chuck wagon greeted the travelers as they arrived in Pacific Junction, a community located west of Bethlehem, the site of the Mormon's original winter encampment.

Post offices in two Mills County communities - Mineola and Silver City - will keep their operations up and running, at least for now.

A moratorium on post office closings and consolidations was announced last week by Postmaster General Marvin Runyon. The moratorium means the "review" process for the Mineola and Silver City post offices has been put on hold and regular postal service in both communities will continue indefinitely.

Earlier this year, both Mineola and Silver City residents were informed their respective post offices were being reviewed by postal service officials for possible closure or consolidation of services.

At a public meeting in late January, more than 150 residents turned out at the Silver City Community Hall to voice their concerns about the review process and its possible consequences.

"We don't want to settle for anything less than a full-service post office (with

a postmaster)," Silver City Mayor Jeff Carper said. "Anything less would be unacceptable.

"This is an important issue that we can't go to sleep on.'

Herb Swan, the Great Plains Region Postal Service Review Coordinator, told the audience the review of the Mineola and Silver City post offices began when the facilities lost their postmasters. Both facilities are currently being operated by an officer in charge.

Written and oral opposition to the possible closing or restructuring of the two facilities may have played a role in the postal service's decision to grant a reprieve to towns like Mineola and Silver City, Swan said in a telephone interview

At the meeting in Silver City, residents were urged to voice their concerns about the plan to postal officials.

With the reprieve now in place, residents in both Mineola and Silver City are now focusing on the re-establishment of a postmaster in their respective communities.
