Capital campaign planned to help fund upgrades to ballfields

As the Glenwood Baseball/ Softball Club gears up for another season, more than just games are on the club's schedule this spring and summer.

The club that has served Glenwood's youth baseball and softball players for over a decade is gearing up for a capital campaign to upgrade its home at the Glenwood Community Recreational Complex along East Sharp Street. The club is diverse in what is offered; everything from the high-level travel teams that compete at that state and regional level down to the recreational league level with the Council Bluffs youth club and YMCA. Fremont Co. deputy honored at Peace Officer Memorial

Fremont County Deputy Austin "Melvin" Richardson, who died last June while on duty, was one of two law enforcement officers from Iowa remembered Friday during a ceremony at the Iowa Peace Officer Memorial in Des Moines. Coralville Police Sgt. John Karl Williams was also recognized.

Gov Kim Reynolds along with representatives from the Iowa Department of Public Safety, Fremont County Sheriff's office and Coralville Police Department participated in the ceremony. Family members of both law enforcement officers were also in attendance.

Deputy Richardson had just completed a call for service on June 14, 2022, and was traveling in his patrol car on Highway 275 near Hamburg. Upon cresting a hill, Richardson encountered a harvesting combine being operated partially in his lane of the road. Richardson's patrol car collided with the combine, causing him him to lose control of the vehicle. Richardson died at the scene of the collision. He had served as a police officer and deputy for 14 years and was a member of two fire and rescue teams. He is survived by his wife, Jennifer, along with their three daughters.

Sgt. Williams responded with his peers to a report of a three-

year-old boy who had suffered a gunshot wound to the head on July 3, 2022. During the investigation, Williams advised his fellow officers that he was not feeling well and returned to the police department building. Once there, he began to experience severe chest pain and went into cardiac arrest. Despite lifesaving measures performed by responding paramedics, Williams passed away shortly after arriving at a local hospital – as did the little boy who had suffered the gunshot wound. Williams was a 28-year veteran of the Coralville Police Department. He is survived by his wife, Kim, along with two sons, two daughters, and six grandchildren.

"Every kid in Glenwood can play regardless of their financial or physical means," said Shawn Koehler, president of the GBSC board. "That's an obligation for us. If a kid wants to play in a wheelchair, we'll figure it out. We want every kid to experience baseball if they want to."

The club is currently fundraising as they do most years, offering outfield banners to area businesses, services clubs and organizations. The GBSC is a tax-exempt nonprofit, so all donations are tax deductible.

Support has been great, Koehler said. Whatever private funding they get, the club has typically managed to double that donation with grants – and volunteers.

"The more people we have involved, the more banners that go up, the more donors we have, it's really big for grantors because they see the level of support in the community," he said. "Our number of kids involved is outstanding. We're the largest youth sports organization in Glenwood right now and we're continuing to grow. It's exciting."

The GBSC has received large anonymous donations in the past and they're hoping that continues into its next phase of revamping the facilities. The club organized into its current structure 12 years ago and while participation numbers have seen consistent growth, the fields have stayed mostly stagnant. Since 2019, the club has invested over \$45,000 and 2000 volunteer hours in renovating the fields, owned by the City of Glenwood. Along with these investments the club has applied thousands in scholarships and investments in game equipment and gear. All of it funded by banner advertisements, private donations, and grants.

Several financial partners have been critical for this success; The Southwest Iowa Foundation, Rotary Club, Boy Scouts of America, Glenwood Fraternal Order of Eagles, Kiwanis, Lions Club, and other private donors. The investment has had an impact, Koehler said.

In all, more 220 youth athletes take part in the GBSC. The cost to play ranges from \$130 to \$500 per player. None of those fees goes toward anything outside their cost to play for that season and no child will be turned down from playing. But field capacity issues and the conditions at the complex are boiling up.

The complex opened with a single field hosting high school games in the 1960s. In the late 1970s' three more fields were added. Since, the complex footprint and infrastructure has changed very

Veteran Middle School teacher receives Charles E. Lakin Award

A social studies teacher at the Glenwood Middle School has been named the recipient of the Charles E. Lakin Outstanding Teacher Award.

Kelsey Miller was presented the award during a surprise ceremony last Monday in the school gymnasium. The Charles E. Lakin Outstanding Teacher Award is given annually to four southwest Iowa public school teachers from non-urban schools within a 40-mile radius of Emerson, which was the hometown of the late philanthropist Charles Lakin. Winners of the Lakin Award receive \$10,000 for personal use and their respective district receives an award of \$2,500. Miller was among 220 nominees for the award.

"I was definitely surprised," Miller said. "I was just instantaneously overwhelmed but also super appreciative. I work with so many wonderful teachers here at the middle school who are more than deserving of the award, too."

A nomination letter stated Miller develops her students' ability to think fully about complex issues and not tell them what to think, which sets her class apart from many others.

"I ask some compelling questions in class – big idea questions that require the kids to really do some research and investigation into sources and then they can form their opinion based on the evidence that

they find.

"Those compelling questions are supposed to really encourage the kids to think about an issue fully and then give them plenty of time to figure out how they feel and why they feel the way they do. We spend a lot of time talking about valid and reliable sources and how to evaluate bias and neutrality."

Miller said topics of discussion in her classroom often focus on pertinent global issues. Classroom issues this year have included the war in Ukraine, nuclear proliferation and migration.

"Current and contemporary global issues are always changing and evolving so what is taught this year might not be what is taught next year," she said. "We spend a lot of time building some background knowledge, talking to each other, learning from each other and sharing our ideas because for some kids, current events is definitely not in their realm of what they spend their time doing during the course of a day."

Miller is in her 13th year as a full-time teacher with the Glenwood Community School District. Prior to her hiring, she was a student teacher in Glenwood while earning her bachelor's degree from Buena Vista University. Miller's first nine years in the district were spent teaching special education, with a focus on reading and language arts. She's in her fourth year teaching social studies classes at GMS.

Miller, who also has a master's degree from Morningside University, said she enjoys her work and is hopeful someday she can move into a position that would allow her to do some instructional coaching with other teachers.

"Right now, I am really happy to be where I'm at working with students every day and getting to share my passions with history and social studies," she said. "But, there is so much more reading and critical thinking involved. I'm hoping they'll take some of those skills into high school and later on into life and have some of those harder conversations and do some harder thinking that we don't all do.'

Middle School Principal Heidi Stanley said Miller is deserving of the honor.

"Kesley is a very dedicated educator and is passionate about teaching and learning," Stanley said. "She uses a variety of strategies to engage her students in the learning process.'

Stanley noted that Miller serves as the middle school technology integration teacher and serves on both building and district leadership teams.

"Kelsey is well respected by both her students and her colleagues and is an inspiration to all that are fortunate enough to work with her," she said.


Ideally, Koehler added, the club would secure an existing building, add turf and

There's no denying the rich history at the current complex, Koehler said. Preserving as much of that history is as important as growing the future of the program.



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

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Billy McGuigan to kick off Davies Amphitheater season

"As great a value as Gold Cards are, there were two or three shows every year that they wouldn't work for - not this year."

Also for 2023 every show will be sponsored with sponsors given unlimited numbers of free tickets to give out. "Our goal is to get people in the seats," said Mitts. "We would love to see 500 people out there every weekend enjoying this fantastic facility."




Dustin West will bring his George Strait tribute show to the Davies Amphitheater on July 15.



Experiences from a lifetime of volunteerism

It seems most of my life, I have had a habit of sticking my hand

up a bit too soon when someone asks – "Do I have a volunteer?" Since I have

group or topic, having showed up at the meeting, I think (often wrongly), who better than me could run this? There are usually a LOT of others who could do a better job, but I figure after a short time period, someone else will volunteer to take my place. In this matter, I have been proven wrong more than a few times.

I am pretty good at recognizing talent rather quickly but getting that talented person to take over my duties has always proven difficult. It started back in high school when I offered to be on the ballot for Class Secretary (no one else did), so I was elected in a landslide having no opposition. Then, because I did such a great job my freshman year, I got no opposition the remainder of my high school career, so served four straight years as Secretary. In my military career, at least in the Officer Corp, you get noticed by stepping up to do things no one else wants to tackle.

While this can be good for your career advancement, it does lead to being a bit overwhelmed at times with all those side duties that are not exactly part of the job description. Thus, as the squadron "tax officer", I would end up helping dozens of guys out each tax season in filing their forms on time from a remote site in England or Korea, or even North Dakota (LOL). I did learn a lot more about our tax system, but dealing with each man's taxes, and they were all from a different state it seemed, often got a bit confusing for me. Three times I started the investment club where we lived, and each time, ran it until we moved away as no one would step up to take over from me. Happily, here in Glenwood, I am in an investment club I DID NOT start, but I am finding being the Secretary is a busy job in its own right.

Another time, I volunteered to be a Secretary for the Air Force Association in Ohio. Mind you, this was before most had email capacity and with 4800 members, you can only imagine the mailing issues. Luckily, I had my own secretary at work who helped me once a month with those chores. It took a heart stent surgery to give me a break, and during the time I was out, the rumor swept that I had died, so they named a scholarship for me at the university nearby. They were surprised then to see me alive and well a month later but kept the scholarship active to this day.

One year, I organized a three-day road trip for the 50 members of my investment group members of my Ohio group, and it was such a success, I ended up in charge of that every year going forward (almost 12 more years to be exact). The word got out I organized wonderful outings, so our church group wanted me to set up dinner theatre outings and I did that for over a dozen years as well. 


