## Rams down Cyclones 6-2

The Glenwood soccer team improved to 8-1 on the season with a 6-2 victory over Harlan in a match played at Morrison Stadium on the campus of Creighton University Thursday evening.

The Rams (8-1) got out to a quick 2-0 lead with goals by Cameron King and Caden Johnson. Harlan cut that lead in half just before the break.

Johnson scored in the 50th and the 54th minute – sandwiched around a Harlan goal – to give the Rams a 4-2 lead. Renner Bardsley then found the back of the net off a set piece and Lovato scored the capper in the 64th minute off rare a bending corner kick past the Cyclone keeper.

“The match was full of great things and some things we need to fix,” said Glenwood coach Cort Lovato. “The boys were able to complete over 300 passes on the large pitch at Creighton and that directly contributed to the number of goals.”

The six goals could have been more, Lovato said, had they not missed a penalty kick and had higher return rate on their 29 shots on goal.

“The boys are happy with the six considering Harlan is a very organized and defensive team that loves to counter,” Lovato said. “We had some communication challenges in the back line that directly led to both of Harlan’s goals.”

“The back line and midfield were able to limit Harlan to 87 completed passes, which is the reason for the 62 percent possession rate the boys had. The two goals were disappointing; however,

we can fix the challenges this week at training.”

With his three goals against the Cyclones, Johnson became the all-time leading scorer in Glenwood boy’s soccer history. His 73 career goals surpassed the record of former Ram great Kirk Artist’s 71 goals from 1999-2002.

### Glenwood 10, Kuemper Catholic 0

Caden Johnson scored four goals to lead Glenwood to a 10-0 victory over Kuemper Catholic in Hawkeye 10 Conference boys soccer last Tuesday.

The Rams controlled the match from the start with Johnson getting on the board twice with goals in the first 12 minutes. Adam Severn added another goal in the 16th, Johnson his third of the half and Cameron King in the 38th minute to put them ahead 5-0 at intermission.

Virginio Rangel Gonzales, Johnson, King and Renner Bardsley added second half goals, with Rangel Gonzales’ capper in the 62nd minute ending the game.

“The boys played well throughout the match,” said Glenwood coach Cort Lovato. “Kuemper is still a young team and getting better every match. The boys were able to have 62 percent possession which made for lots of long passing strings. We need to work on our finishing in and around the box when 7-8 defenders are behind the ball.”

“It is difficult to maintain that focus and not become frustrated in those situations. The boys were able to score 10 despite that scenario and keep clean sheet number 5 on the season.”

Casey Godbout had two saves in goal and picked up his fifth clean sheet in goal.

## Glenwood grad will play for rugby national title

Nick Gill admits he was a late bloomer when it came to rugby.

A one-time football player with a penchant for defense and hard hits, the 2019 Glenwood Community High School graduate didn’t take up rugby until he was a junior in high school.

Just over five years to the day of playing his first rugby match, Gill will start at inside center for the Men’s Rugby Club at Iowa State in the Division I-AA rugby national title against the University of San Diego in Boulder, Colo. May 6.

Gill wouldn’t call his rise in rugby as meteoric. He paid his dues for the Cyclones, working his way up from B-side – junior varsity team – to substitute, to full-time starter.

But when he first took up the sport, he was a novice.

Gill got his first taste of rugby in high school when he joined the Full Armor Glenwood Rugby Club at the behest of friends Eli and Isaac Bales, both standout players on the team. Gill was intrigued by the physicality of the game and the no-pads, all contact aspects but knew little about the intricacies of the game.

“I knew it was a little like soccer and football combined and you could hit people and run with the ball,” he said. “I wasn’t sure what my parents would think of the no-pads thing.”

Finally, his junior year, he talked to his

parents, did some research, watched some videos and after securing his parent’s blessing, he said, “I’m in.”

He was in love with the sport almost immediately. The former linebacker and long snapper on the Ram football team found his skilled meshed nicely with rugby.

heard I could actually score - they call it a try in rugby - that sold me," he said.

"Being a linebacker, I was taught in Glenwood really safe tackling form so that helped and then with passing (the ball) there's something about the feel of the ball in my hands that felt a lot like being a long snapper."

He recalls those first few practices as unsure and shaky. It took him a while to get the game down and understand the rules and his position.

But then he got to his first game.

Played on sloppy, muddy field with temperatures in the 30s during a sleet storm, the conditions were far from ideal. And it that couldn't

have mattered less to Gill.

"It was probably the worst conditions possible to play in and I just remember we all came out together wearing no sleeves and no cold weather gear and saying we're going to tackle through it," he said.

He can still recall his first tackle - "The guy was probably twice my size," he said - and getting thrown the ball and colliding full speed with a defender 20 yards down the field.

"I knew right then, I love this game," he said.

His talents carried him to Iowa State - after considering joining Isaac Bales at the University of Louisville - where he's been a four-year contributor for the Cyclones.

He earned Heart of America Conference honors this season.

Gill mainly plays the inside center position, which requires a very hard and powerful runner on offense who also loves to tackle. Inside centers are used for the short tough running game of rugby like a fullback in football. He also does some kicking for the Cyclones.

"We're kind of the playmakers," he said of his positional duties. "Our job is distributing the ball out wide, whether it's to our forwards to set up in a pod of three or swinging wide our backline guys that are quick. We keep the ball movement and the flow of our structure moving."

In March, Gill and the Cyclones defeated Minnesota in the Heart of America Conference title game to advance to nationals. They won their spot - the first for the Cyclones - in the national championship game with a 36-29 win over Sam Houston State in Houston in the final four.

"We didn't have much on them, but they were very defensively sound," Gill said. His team led 19-7 at the half but couldn't shake the Bearkats' physical play.

"It was their home field, and they were used to the heat and humidity. It was a very mentally tough game. We didn't do a lot of the little stuff when we got up and they were the best defensive

team we've played all year. Physically we knew this was going to be tough game the first 20 minutes. The second half we had some injuries, but we held them off at the very end."

Gill calls the semifinal one of the best games he's been a part of.

"Just how much it meant and to see everybody battle through like we did, we were so gassed and tired, it was great to see," he said.

"It feels great to be a part of this. When I came in, I played mostly B-side (junior varsity) and I feel like I finally got my start last fall. Being a part of this team has been great. We lost in our conference semifinals last year, so we didn't get to

make nationals. This was our goal this year. Meeting those goals this year has been great for me and the team."

Regardless of the outcome in the title game, Gill doubts it will be the last time he lines up on the pitch. A senior criminal justice major who also serves in the Iowa National Guard, Gill's next stop after graduation will be active duty. Where exactly, he's not sure. But he hopes they have a rugby team.

"I've looked into it (playing) wherever I'm stationed to see if there's a club team there," he said. "And if not, I'd like to get into coaching. I'd love to give back what I love. I love rugby and I'd like to share that passion with others."

added to read in full as follows: 42.08 UNLAWFUL OBSTRUCTION OF PUBLIC WAYS AND PROPERTY. 1. Definition: The term "camp" or "camping" shall mean the use of public property as a temporary or permanent place of dwelling, lodging, or residence, or as a living accommodation at any time between sunset or sunrise, or as a sojourn. Evidence of camping may include, but are not limited to, storage of personal belongings, using tents, cars, or other temporary or semi-permanent structures for sleeping or storage of personal belongings, carrying on cooking activities or making any fire in an unauthorized area, or any of these activities in combination with

one another or in combination with either sleeping or making preparation to sleep, including the laying down or placement of bedding for the purpose of sleeping. 2. Prohibited Act: It is unlawful for any person to camp or to place any camp upon any public street, sidewalk, park, building, or land, except while camping in areas specifically designated for camping by the City and while acting in accordance with all rules, regulations, and ordinances pertaining to camping in such designated areas, or as otherwise permitted by this code. 3. Penalty: A violation of this section may be prosecuted as a municipal infraction and, upon conviction, an individual is subject to a penalty and

**ORDINANCE NO. 927**  
 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF GLENWOOD, IOWA BY AMENDING THE CITY OF GLENWOOD'S LAND DEVELOPMENT ORDINANCE.  
 BE it enacted by the City of Glenwood, Iowa:  
 SUBSECTION ADDED: Chapter 172, Section 04, Subsection 10 of the Glenwood City Code of Ordinances is hereby added as follows:  
**172.04(10)**

### SET BACK ADJUSTMENTS

10. A Book Exchange Structure is accessory outside storage defined as an enclosed structure that holds books or other literacy material to be shared or exchanged in a pedestrian accessible location constructed and maintained by the owner of the property.  
 (1) Book Exchange Structures may only be placed on private property owned by the individual placing the structure, unless a written release

has been granted from the property owner.  
 (2) Book Exchange Structures are allowed in a required front, side, or rear yard.  
 (a) OR Book Exchange Structures must be placed on a property with sidewalk access. Exceptions may be allowed with placement approval from the City of Glenwood.  
 (3) The maximum dimensions of Book Exchange Structures are 20 inches wide, 18 inches deep, and 5

feet in height.  
 (4) A maximum of one Book Exchange Structure is allowed in the combined setbacks on any particular lot.  
 (5) Book Exchange Structures must be located a minimum of 10 feet from adjacent property lines.  
 (6) Book Exchange Structures shall be at least 12 inches away from the public sidewalk on the non-street side, and all the following shall apply:  
 (a) Cannot be used for selling or

advertising.  
 (b) Cannot be placed or protrude into the public right-of-way.  
 (c) Cannot obstruct required parking.  
 (d) Cannot be placed in the visibility triangle.  
 (e) Made of material resistant to damage or deterioration from exposure to the outside environment.  
 (f) Properly mounted, bolted, and protected to withstand winds, rains, and other seasonal changes: and

(g) Regular upkeep and monitoring.  
 (h) A violation of any of the foregoing regulations is subject to Code Enforcement and may be enforced as a municipal infraction and by way of abatement of the Book Exchange Structure.

## City of Glenwood

**ORDINANCE NO. 928**  
 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF GLENWOOD, IOWA BY AMENDING THE CITY OF GLENWOOD'S ORDINANCE PERTAINING TO INOPERABLE VEHICLES AND JUNK.  
 BE it enacted by the City of Glenwood, Iowa:  
 Chapter 51 of the Glenwood City Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read in full as follows:  
**PURPOSE.** The purpose of this Chapter is to:

- Promote and protect the health, safety, and general welfare of the residents and property owners in the City of Glenwood.
- Protect property values and the health, safety, and general welfare of the residents of the City of Glenwood by limiting the use of the public right-of-way for the storage of unused vehicles, inoperable vehicles, unused motor vehicles, and inoperable motor vehicles.
- Protect the City of Glenwood's natural resources.
- Promote the fair and equitable use of the public rights-of-way within the City of Glenwood.

**51.01 DEFINITIONS.** For use in this chapter, the following terms are defined:

- "Unused vehicle," "unused motor vehicle," "inoperable vehicle" and "inoperable motor vehicle" is any vehicle to which any one or more of the following criteria applies:
  - Unlicensed. Any vehicle which is required to be registered under the laws of the State of Iowa that is not registered for the current year.
  - Inoperable. Any vehicle not in a safe and current operating condition such that, upon request of a City of Glenwood police officer or nuisance enforcement officer, the vehicle cannot be started and moved a distance of at least 50 feet.
  - Uninsured. Any vehicle which lacks financial liability coverage, or for which the owner does not possess and produce proof of financial liability coverage, as required under Iowa Code § 321.20B.
  - Missing or Broken Glass. Any vehicle in which any portion of the vehicle's windshield, window(s), head light(s), or tail-light(s) is missing or broken, regardless of whether any such vehicle component is or was composed of glass or one or more other materials.
  - Wheels and Tires. Any vehicle that lacks functional and usable wheels or tires.
  - Broken or Loose Parts. Any vehicle with broken or loose parts

that constitute a danger because of exposed, sharp, or jagged edges, or that make any interior portion of the vehicle, including the trunk or engine compartment, accessible to children or animals.

- Habitat for Nuisance Animals. Any vehicle that has become a habitat for rats, mice, or other vermin or insects.
- Defective or Obsolete Condition. Any other vehicle that, because of its defective or obsolete condition, in any other way constitutes a threat to the public health or safety.
- Mere licensing of a vehicle described in section 51.01(1), above, does not constitute a defense to the finding that the vehicle is in violation of this article, provided that one or more other characteristics exist which define an unused vehicle in this article.

3. "Motor vehicle" means every vehicle which is or is intended to be self-propelled.

4. "Person" means any individual, association, organization, corporation, partnership, firm (either incorporated or unincorporated), or business entity of any type.

5. "Vehicle" means every device in, upon, or by which any person or property is or may be transported or drawn upon a street or highway, excepting devices moved by human power or used exclusively upon rails or tracks, and including without limitation a motor vehicle, automobile, truck, motorcycle, tractor, buggy, wagon, farm machinery, or any combination thereof.

6. "Junk" means all old or scrap copper, brass, lead, or any other non-ferrous metal; old or discarded rope, rags, batteries, paper, trash, rubber, debris, waste or used lumber, or salvaged wood; dismantled or inoperable vehicles, machinery and appliances or parts of such vehicles, machinery or appliances; iron, steel or other old or scrap ferrous materials; old or discarded glass, tinware, plastic or old or discarded household goods or hardware. Neatly stacked firewood located on a side yard or a rear yard is not considered to be junk.

**51.02 KEEPING, PARKING AND STORAGE OF UNUSED, INOPERABLE OR JUNK.**  
 No person shall park, place, keep or store or permit the parking, placing, keeping or storage of an unused or inoperable vehicle, vehicular component parts or miscellaneous junk and debris on any public or private property within the corporate limits of the City unless it is within a completely enclosed building. No person shall accumulate, store, or place, or

permit the accumulation, storage, or placement, of any unused vehicle in any public right-of-way within the City. This section does not apply to short term emergency repairs or on licensed vehicles. The definition of "short term" shall be determined by the Police Chief and the Public Works Director at their discretion. This section does not apply to auto salvage yards lawfully operated within the City and enclosed by a fence or wall at least eight (8) feet in height and so constructed as to prevent unauthorized entrance and access. If a violation of this section occurs upon private property, the owner or person in control of said property shall be prima facie liable for said violation.

**51.03 INOPERABLE VEHICLES AND JUNK A NUISANCE.** It is hereby declared that any inoperable or unused vehicle or junk located on private property, unless excepted by section 51.02, constitutes a threat to the health and safety of the citizens and is a nuisance within the meaning of Section 657.1 of the Code of Iowa. Upon discovery of any inoperable or unused vehicle or junk located on private property in violation of this chapter, the City shall initiate abatement procedures as outlined in Chapter 50 of the Code of Ordinances.  
**51.04 VEHICLES THAT CANNOT MOVE UNDER THEIR OWN POWER.**

- No person shall detach any camper, motorized or vehicle-drawn recreational vehicle, vehicle in tow, trailer of any type, or other vehicle that cannot move under its own power from a towing vehicle and leave it standing in any public right-of-way.
  - No person shall unload a pickup camper from a pickup truck and leave it standing in any public right-of-way.
  - No person shall leave a watercraft, whether standing on a trailer or standing by itself, on any public right-of-way, unless physically attached to an operable motor vehicle.
  - Subsections 1, 2, and 3 shall not apply to the following:
    - A construction site as permitted by the City Administrator or Zoning Administrator
    - The site of a special event as permitted by the City Manager; or
    - During loading or unloading of a camper, motorized or vehicle-driven recreational vehicle, vehicle in tow, trailer of any type, or other vehicle that cannot move under its own power, including pickup campers and watercraft, for a period not exceeding four continuous hours.
- 51.05 PENALTIES/ENFORCEMENT.**

1. Any person who violates this article shall be subject to a parking citation and other relief provided in this code.

2. Upon discovery of any unused vehicle in violation of this article, the City Police or Nuisance Officer may initiate abatement proceedings as outlined in this article, in addition to any parking citations issued.

3. In addition to any civil penalty and court costs which may be imposed, any person who violates this article shall also be liable to the City of Glenwood for the costs associated with abatement of the unused vehicle, including actual costs, damages, expenses, staff time, and attorney fees incurred by the City of Glenwood, including any costs for the removal and storing of the vehicle.

**51.06 ABATEMENT PROCEDURE.**

1. Upon judgment in favor of the City of Glenwood regarding any municipal infraction issued pursuant to this article, the Chief of Police or Fire Chief may cause any vehicle which is subject to the judgment to be removed from the public right-of-way and stored at a location designated by the Chief of Police.

**51.07 AUCTION SALE.** All inoperable vehicles removed and impounded shall be sold to the highest bidder at a public auction, the time and place of which shall be duly published in a newspaper of general circulation within the City not less than seven (7) days before said auction. All revenues derived from such sale shall accrue to the City for the purpose of recovering its costs of removal and sale. Any excess revenue from such sale shall be paid to the owner of the vehicle. Any unrecovered costs shall be the responsibility of the owner of the vehicle.

**51.08 LOT PARKING.** No property owner or person in possession thereof shall allow more than two (2) vehicles, whether operable or inoperable, to be parked upon any lot exclusive of vehicles parked entirely on driveways or in garages or carports.  
**51.09 LOT PARKING DURATION.** No property owner or person in possession thereof shall knowingly or unknowingly allow the parking or placement of any vehicles upon any lots, exclusive of driveways, garages or carports for more than seven (7) days.  
**51.10 LOT DEFINED.** The term "lot" as used in this chapter shall mean a lot as defined in Section 166.15(4) of the City Code of Ordinances.
