

## Glenwood sweeps home invite

The Glenwood girls and boys track team swept the team title at their own Glenwood Cross Country Invitational Saturday at Glenwood Lake Park.

The Ram boys, ranked No. 4 in Class 3A and the girls, ranked No. 5 in 3A, ran away from the field in both races to win the team titles. Without top runner Bryant Keller, who was held out for precautionary reasons because of some leg soreness, the Rams still placed seven runs among the top 15 finishers and tallied 46 points. The girls were no less dominant, finishing with 42 points behind seven runners among the top 22.

Glenwood boys coach Todd Peverill thought his team was poised for a good day but even he was surprised.

"They ran great," he said. "When you have eight of the top 17 runners, that's unreal. With running junior varsity and varsity together I knew it was going to be beneficial for us because of our depth. I did the calculations and our J.V. would have finished sixth in the scored them as varsity team."

Andrew Smith led the Glenwood boys with a fourth-place finish time of 17 minutes. Dillon Anderson added a ninth-place finish followed by Kevin Coots in 10th, Liam Hayes in 11th, Jackson Griffin in 12th.

"We had four guys, our second, third, fourth and fifth runners, all finished within 15 seconds of each other," he said. "That's an incredible spread and then you look at our first through our fifth runners and it's only 1:15. That's pretty special. We're

a strong team."

Peverill said it wasn't easy to talk Keller, a state qualifier a year ago, out of running at the meet.

"He had some soreness, and we didn't want to take a chance," Peverill said. "We didn't think we'd need him to win the meet, so we rested him for

Pella this week. He knew why we had to do it. We're worried more about the state meet than this meet so we didn't want to take a risk we didn't have to."

The Glenwood girls were led by Madelyn Berglund's fourth place finish time of 20:20. Lauren Hughes added a sixth-place finish, Breckyn

## Rams shrug off rough start in win

As bad starts go, it was pretty bad.

In the opening 1:46, Glenwood returned the opening kick-off for a touchdown only to see it nullified by a penalty, turned the ball over and then allowed Atlantic to get on the board on its very first offensive snap, a 47-yard touchdown toss.

And yet, the Rams never folded. They scored 21 unanswered points over the next 11 minutes and cruised to a 43-27 win at the Glenwood Athletic Complex Friday.

Glenwood coach Cory Faust gave his team mixed reviews following the win. He stopped short of calling the victory the "big step" he looked for following the season-opening loss to Sioux City East but found the results hard to argue with.

"A win is a win," he said. "We should celebrate every time we win a football game but overall, I'm a little disappointed with some things I saw. I didn't have them ready to play or they weren't ready to play, and it was a combination of things we can control."

Following the Trojans' first scoring drive, the Rams went right to work. A touchdown pass from Kayden Anderson to Payton Longmeyer opened the scoring and Glenwood got its ground game going with a pair of touchdown scampers by Tate Mayberry to take the 21-7 lead.

Anderson would connect with Cody Krause on a TD pass and Mayberry would run another in and the Ram defense would block a punt for a safety to put them in control 36-14 at the half.

The two teams traded in the third quarter before each found the end zone midway through the final frame. Trojan quarterback Caden Anderson would connect with Colton Rasmussen on a 47-yard TD pass to trim the lead to 43-27 with 3:21 to go. The Rams would recover the high-arcing on-side kick on the ensuing possession.

Glenwood tallied 295 of their 419 total yards in the first half. After running for just 15 yards on 17 carries a week ago, the Rams rushed for 74 yards on 24 carries Friday. An improvement, but not where Faust wants his team to be.

"We do have a lot more of offensive package that we're capable of running," he said. Some injuries have kept us from doing that, but we have to establish the run better than we are right now."

Anderson had his second straight 300-yard passing night, finishing 18-of-28 for 345 yards and three TDs. Krause hauled in six passes for

181 yards and two scores. Longmeyer finished with five catches for 56 yards and a TD. The Ram defense still has Faust perplexed.

more than 600 yards, the coach spent time going through scheme and real-time playback with his team on a sideline monitor throughout the game. Atlantic finished with 457 total yards.

## Wolverines go on road for win at Woodbine

East Mills blew open a 12-point half-time lead with a 29 unanswered second half points in a 55-14 rout of Woodbine Friday in Eight-player football.

The Wolverine defense returned two interceptions for touchdowns and blocked a punt for a touchdown in the win.

East Mills co-head coach Kevin Schafer said the game was much closer

than the score indicated.

"We were out yarded 389 to 277 and ran less than 10 offensive plays in the second half," Schafer said. "Defensively, we did create a lot of turnovers. We also blocked a punt for a touchdown. That is also why we didn't have the ball much in the second half and why they had more yards than us. We bent but did not break on D, and offensively we moved the ball efficiently."

Quarterback Zach Thornburg, making his first varsity start, completed

6-of-10 passes for 115 yards and a touchdown and rushed for 79 yards and three TDs to lead the offense.

Ryan Stortenbecker picked up 83 yards rushing and a touchdown on offense and picked off a pass for a touchdown and wrapped up eight solo tackles on defense.

Woodbine did out-gain East Mills 389 to 277 but they turned the ball over five times. Freshman quarterback Brodyn Pryor finished 19-of-41 with 283 yards, two TDs and four interceptions.

From the late 1920s through the end of World War II, studios like MGM, Warner Bro., 20th Century Fox, Paramount, and RKO

would dominate film production, not only in America but throughout the world. The reasons for Hollywood's success during this period are intriguing. Despite the economic problems posed by the Depression, the studios became virtual entertainment factories, with each studio producing more than 50 movies a year. The legacy of these years of frenzied activity are among the best-loved and most significant films

ever made.
