



Strong group of athletes return for Glenwood this track season

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First-year Glenwood girls track coach Jordan Bueltel inherits a team this season that returns 10 athletes that competed at the state track meet and a bevy of talent this season.

That mix of experience and depth should allow the Rams to try different lineups and keep fresh during the season while competing at every track meet this season.

"I'm pretty impressed with our depth and overall talent," Bueltel said. "We have a lot of talent coming in with our freshmen and sophomores. We have a lot of speed and talent overall, so we need to see where they (the freshman and sophomores) mesh with our upperclassmen. I' excited to see what we can do."

In all, the Rams' roster includes 53 athletes, 33 of which are freshman and sophomores. Senior Abby Hughes leads an experienced core of returners that gained valuable experience last season on a Hawkeye 10 Conference championship team and at the state meet. Hughes ran in four events at state and took home a fifth-place medal in the 400-meter hurdles.

Bueltel thinks Hughes, who has pledged to run track at South Dakota State, is poised to have a strong senior season.

"The 400 hurdles was her big event last year and there's ways she can definitely take some time off last year," he said. "I don't know what her goal is, but I think she'd like to improve on her fifth from last year. We can get some seconds off there. She'll work into the 100-meter hurdles this year. She'll be all over the sprint relays too. Her versatility helps us a lot."

The Rams should continue to be particularly strong in their sprint relays. At last year's state meet they qualified in the 4x100, 4x200, 4x400 and sprint medley relays.

"We might not have the fastest individual girl in a meet but we're probably going to have four or five who are going to be right up there and that's going to be a strength for us this year," Bueltel said.

The concerns aren't glaring right now for the coach, but he is still searching for a high jumper where several first timers and a handful of freshmen are vying for spots. The hurdle events are also a little shallow with experience, he said, but the talent is there.

Bueltel said the girls who were out for basketball had a head start but overall, the team is "getting there."

"We're relatively healthy and mostly injury free," he said. "We feel good about where we're at."

Where the Rams are at the end of the season will come down to meeting and exceeding expectations.

"Our depth will help us compete in the conference and meets around here," Bueltel said. "Abby will have the ability to score some points at state and we feel like we have a few others that can too. Just how good those relays can be and if they're good enough to get there or score at state will be something we'll figure out."

As the defending conference champions, Bueltel knows teams will push the Rams this season.

"The Hawkeye 10 always has good runners," he said. "Hopefully our depth and what we have allows us to compete again. We won't be sneaking up on anyone this season. Hopefully we put ourselves in position to win some meets and state on top the Hawkeye 10."

Deep, talented Rams squad aiming for Hawkeye 10 title

With a large contingent of experienced athletes returning on his 68 person roster, Glenwood boys track coach Mark Starner is cautiously optimistic about his 2022's team's prospects.

"We have a good shot to score a lot of points in a lot of places," Starner said, adding his team has a good balance up and down the roster including 22 returning letter winners.

The Rams look particularly strong in the middle to long distances, the hurdles and the field events.

Starner counted more than a half dozen runners capable of running anything from a 100 to an 800 in a competitive open or relay.

Andrew Smith and Bryant Keller return after earning state meet bids in the 3,200-meter last season and having strong cross country seasons.

Jason Colpitts and Logyn Eckheart lead a strong group of experienced throwers that includes Caleb Dressel and Reagan Skarnulis.


"We'll have those guys in the mix but they'll be out main throwers for us," he said.

Cody Krause is back after qualifying for state in both the long jump and high jump. Along with Kord Ostrander the Rams will have a nice one-two punch at high jump.

"Across the board, this is probably the deepest team we've had in a while," Starner said. "We don't have too many spots that are open but we're not flashy in anything. We're above average in about everything. We have pieces we can move around. I think we have the potentially to be better than pretty good in late at the state meet. Right now, I think we can score a lot of points at meet and do a lot of things, which is good."

That depth will Starner to juggle and tinker with where his athletes fit, which events and which relays throughout the season as he seeks out the right combinations.

"We want to find out what we have early in the season," he said. "We want to put kids in different positions and see how they react to that. We don't want to pigeon hole kids into anything because things obviously change as the

year goes on. We're going to give kids different opportunities and see what they can do."

The Rams are in good shape, Starner said, as he balances keeping his squad fresh and injury-free while still working on speed training.

"We'll back off if we have to but we're in pretty decent shape."

Council Bluffs Lewis Central narrowly edged Glenwood by just two points for last year's Hawkeye 10 Conference title.

"It came down to the last race and it was two points," he said. "The winner of that last race was going to win it and it came down to horses. We're working on that. We're not where we still need to be but working on it."

Starner said his team's goals rarely very year to year – that's how the Rams have stayed successful.

"We go into every meet wanting to finish in the top three," Starner said. "If we can do that and compete for a conference title against some good teams and spread the wealth around our lineup, and I think we're up for that challenge, we have an opportunity to have a good season."

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Glenwood returns strong core on pitch this season

With 10 players with starting experience, including all-state playmaker Caden Johnson, returning this season the Glenwood boys soccer team is poised for a big year.

If a few holes can be filled from and the line up can gel quickly, headcoach Cort Lovato likes this team's prospects..

"This is the most experienced team we've had since 2016," Lovato said, referencing the team that went 12-4 that season. "We had a pretty good, pretty large senior group with some great leaders. We have the same thing this year. We're going to have five seniors starter and four of them have started since they were freshmen."

With that experience returning, Lovato said it won't change his team's style of play. It will only enhance it.

"We have a certain style and its changed over the years based on personnel but this will be our second season with that same personnel," he said. "We lost two senior starters from last year so our style of play won't change but we do have to find guys to fill those holes. That's our big challenge right now."

Among those losses was second leading goal scorer Jackson Wray (14 goals).

But Lovato isn't worried about his attack.

"A lot of Wray's goals were sheer will goals," Lovato said. "He never quit. We just have to find guys to fill that role and a lot of that is going to come out of how we play. We're midfield dominated in our skill guys."

Johnson, a speedy forward who led the Rams with 20 goals and 15 assists, returns this year. The junior earned a bevy of post season honors last year and will again be one of the top offensive threats in the Hawkeye 10.

"We expect him to match those numbers if not exceed them," Lovato said. "The challenge will be is how teams defend him. He has the ability to break teams down one vs. one. I expect teams will man mark him or set two aside, he's that skilled. So we'll have to adjust. His game has grown and he has the ability to take over matches. He realizes spreading the wealth and making his teammates better will make the team better. I could see him with 20 assists this year. Adding to the mix is

Jade Nanfito (13 goals) and a handful of others who didn't put up gaudy numbers but have the potential to be major goal scorers.

"I like to have a group there so teams can't take away that one goal scorer. It makes us difficult to defend," Lovato said. "Jade as hurt last. He was maybe 40 percent and he still had 13 goals. He's almost back to 100 percent. He will take some of that load."


Lovato also pointed to Jacob Slaughter, Cort Lovato Jr., Jaymee Fritts, Collin Lincoln and Thomas Nieman as players who will see increased goal scoring opportunities.

"The goals we lost from Jackson will be picked up a by a bunch of guys," he said.

At goal, sophomore Casey Godbout is back after starting matches last season. Godbout was not expected to start last season but some late roster changes through the freshman into the fire. Lovato thought he acquitted himself nicely for a first-year starter and is only going to get better.

"I'm not concerned about Casey," Lovato said. "He's matured a lot."

The Rams' schedule is typically tough, and top heavy this season. Their first seven matches include meetings against Sergeant Bluff-Luton, Harlan, A-D-M, Waverly-Shell Rock, Southeast Polk and Council Bluffs Lewis Central. "Lewis Central has a lot of returning starters and they're the favorite in the conference, there's no doubt about that," Lovato said. "Our schedule is tough. I hope we can stay healthy through those first matches. If we can stay healthy, I think our confidence will increase and go from there. It's a cliché, but it's one game and on to the next one."

Glenwood soccer will be versatile, experienced squad

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The Glenwood girls soccer team graduated a talented senior group of players that won 14 games a year ago and finished just short of trip to the state tournament. But head coach Amy Benson likes her team's experience and versatility heading into the 2022 season.

The Rams return seven starters and 10 letter winners that all played key roles last year,

"It's easier to transition into a season with that experience," Benson. "We definitely feel there's a few positions where we lost players but we're fortunate to be pretty versatile. Hopefully we find people that can slide in and fill those shoes."

Returning is the team's top goal scorer in Nora Dougherty. As a freshman Dougherty scored 29 goals and dished out 13 assists.

"She'll be a force to be reckoned with," Benson said. "She's looked really good this season and she's excited to get out there."

Dougherty split time on the pitch last season with sprinting on the Ram track team. She will focus on soccer this season.

The Rams' attack will be aided by the return of Alaina Meads (seven goals) and four others that scored at least three goals in limited opportunities a year ago.

"We return a lot of players from last year so we're just trying to figure out some different positions and spots and learning how to play together," Benson said.

The coach said she doesn't have an glaring concerns right now, except perhaps for staying healthy. Goalkeeper Grace Nightser, who tore her ACL late last season, has been fully cleared. Nightser surrendered just 17 goals all season.

"We're excited to have her back," she said. "We have a few holes on defense but we have options at midfield and defense that can step up."

Conditioning shouldn't be a problem. Benson said her team has a good fitness level and comes to practice every day ready to work.

"We're usually in pretty good shape," she said. "We do have a lot of dual sport athletes that are running track at the same time so they're obviously in good shape. We also have a lot of girls that you can tell worked on their conditioning in the off-season."

Glenwood returns six of top seven scorers on links

The Glenwood boys golf team returns six of its tops seven scorers from last year's team that finished fifth at the Hawkeye 10 Conference meet last season.

Head coach Bryan Diekmann called those half dozen returnees – Braden Snead, Tommy Johnson, Tye Nebel, Gavin Schau, Brady Aistrope and Jacob Mitchell – the "early leaders" of the team.

"We're pretty happy to have them back," he said. "We're going to push to see if we can't get in top three or better. We feel we have the kids to do that. They've put in the work in the offseason and they're competitors. I'm excited that we have them on our team."

Despite the unpredictable spring weather, the Glenwood boys golf team has had a few chances to get on the course. But for the most part Diekmann has had his team hitting at the range and focusing on their short game (putting and chipping).

"I really want to see good contact," he said. "We've been going over rules too. We always want to be respectful on the course. And we want to improve our short game, our putting and chipping have been real focal points. Spring is short so we're trying to focus them and move fast."

Diekmann has seen a growth in his team's overall skill level. He attributes that to more play in the offseason and a renewed interest brought on during the pandemic.

"The kids have definitely put in a lot of time," he said. "Some of the kids picked the game up recently during the pandemic and for a time there got in the habit of golf and as they've put more emphasis on its they've seen the results have come. They're putting in the time to get better. They're definitely excited about the season."

Diekmann's No. 1 priority this season is competing in each and every dual, triangular and tournament the Rams play in. Including the Hawkeye 10 Conference.

"We're going to be competitive, that's always our goal," he said. "We want to always be as competitive as we can. We finished fifth at the Hawkeye 10 last year and we shot a 352. And the other four teams in front of us all return a lot but we just need to focus on us. We think we can be in that 320 to 330 range. I want to see us give ourselves a chance to be up there. I think we've put ourselves in a great position to do that."

Glenwood golf team returns three letter winners

The Glenwood girls golf team returns three varsity letter winners from last year's team but after that group, the remainder of the roster is young and inexperienced.

Coach Maria Jacobus said that the inexperience and the typically up-anddown spring weather has made assessing her team difficult early in practice.

"We haven't had a chance to play a lot of rounds yet with the weather," she said. "We had a few good days but at the beginning you're just trying to remember how to swing a club and try to knock some of the rust off. The team is kind of a blank slate right now and we're trying to figure out where everybody fitting right now."

What Jacobus does know is that senior Sarra Leath and sophomores Avery Joyce and Faith Weber return after starting last season on the varsity. The trio is Jacobus' top three players heading into this season.

Filling out the rest of the varsity lineup isn't as easy. The other nine athletes either played on the junior varsity last season or are new to the game.

"So many of them are blank slates right now and we're trying to figure out where they fit on the team," she said. "Hopefully we can get that figured out this week and be ready for our first match."

Jacobus is approaching her decidedly fundamental-heavy practices with an eye toward development. She hopes to give the more experienced players more of a chance to get re-acclimated by playing holes while tuning in on the basic mechanics and rules for the younger players.

"At the same time you're throwing things at them like how to play a match, how to play holes and if you can't get that done at practice you're sending them video tutorials or posting things on Google classroom for them to read to get them caught up as much you can."

Even with a young roster, Jacobus said her team has set high goals for the season

"They want to place top three in the Hawkeye 10 again, which is pretty consistent for us the last few years which has been great," she said. "They want to keep building consistency and do well in their Hawkeye 10 matches. And of course we want to improve on our placing in regionals.

The Glenwood boys tennis team will have a deep and experienced roster heading into head coach Grant Stivers' second season as head coach.

The Rams return six players that saw action on the varsity last season. That's allowed Glenwood to hit the ground running this spring.

"Tm pretty impressed," Stivers said. "I think a lot of the guys have put in some time, whether it be over the summer or this spring when the weather cooperated, and all 25 guys have come out looked pretty good in early practices."

Stivers' said seniors Josh Nieman and Carter Kirsch, juniors Tyler Harger, Trice Buchanan, Ben Batten and sophomore Brody Taylor all saw considerable varsity action a year ago.

"I have six guys who competed in one shape or form for me on varsity last season," he said. "That's a good depth and it helped us with some success last season and giving us a chance in some duals. We're definitely going to miss Teagan (Matheny) at No. 1, he was a stronghold, but we're trying to see how it shakes out to see who will take that slot."

Leading that charge to replace Matheny will be Harger. The junior, who Stivers called his No. 1 slotted player right now, has shown major strives from last season.

"He's progressed in his game and preparing himself for that upper-level competition, I think," Stivers said. "We haven't had been able to have the challenge matches I'd like with the weathers but those six returners along with few other newcomers who are in the mix will be in that top rotation."

The Rams went 4-5 in duals a year ago and finished a disappointing 10th in the 11-team Hawkeye 10 Conference meet last season. Stivers said

"We had a lot of inexperience last season and a lot of them didn't really know what postseason tennis was like last year," he said. "I think that bit us late in the season. A lot of the guys didn't know how to deal with that full day of tennis and the waiting around and staying competition ready. Trying to stay prepared when it matters most at the end of year is something we've talked about."

East Mills' girls, boys tracks teams loaded with potential

Lots of potential and lots of question marks.

That's how head coach Claude Lang described his East Mills girls and boys track teams heading into this season.

Lange said the talent is there to answer those questions if he can match the potential to events.

"Every year I try and figure out how to win the conference, or at least finish with as many points as we possibly can, with the chess pieces we have," said Lang, who coaches both the girls' and boys' teams. "We'll see if they can make an impact in some relays or individual events, we don't know yet," he said.

Lang likes the balance of his boy's squad between sprinters and distance runners.

"We have a good combination," he said. "We should be able to put together a good track meet. We can definitely compete at the meets in our area and at some of the bigger meets, we can piece together some good relays and earn some points."

On the girls' side, Lang said he lost a few upperclassmen athletes but gained a few others.

"I think if we had everybody out, we'd have a good shot at winning the conference," he said. "I think we might be a couple girls short right now but we're still aiming to be there, scoring as many points as we can. The school record for points is 105 (at the conference meet). That is still the goal." The Wolverines' distance medley and 4x400-meter relays both one the conference a year ago and the bulk of those

runners return.

"I'd like to see us improve on those times," he said. "And individually we do have some pretty good runners back."

Among those individual runners is Emily Williams. The junior all-conference volleyball and basketball player missed the previous few track seasons with injuries. She's 100-percent healthy this year, Lang said, and eager to compete and is poised for a big year.

"I just saw her at the track by herself doing some workouts," he said. "If we can remain healthy, we can be pretty good."

Lang has a handful of girls who have long and high jump experience. On the boys' side, Davis McGrew returns after placing third in the long jump at the conference meet a year ago and Braden West, an all-conference basketball player, is out for high jump.

"He can get up in the air," Lang said. "If we can get some good form on him, he can be exciting."

Elizabeth Albright will take over coaching the throwers. Albright is an experienced thrower herself and Lang said it's the first time in four seasons he's had

a coach that will focus on throws.

The Knights aren't in great shape yet, but they are "getting there," the coach said. The weather, however, has been cooperative this spring for outdoor workouts.

"We've already had one full week outside but then we had another week inside," he said. "Getting out as much as we can is good for us."

Just how good these Knights can be

"We should be right there in the Corner Conference. Essex just got us last year. I think our talent level is better this year. We have more than enough talent in that freshman group. Our goal is to get as many kids as we can to the state track meet."




